Electronically Stored Information (ESI) has been the thorn in the side of many an attorney (and paralegal!). The complexities related to ESI collection, analysis and production have caused many to ignore ESI altogether. But what if you could harness the power of ESI and integrate it into your legal strategy? In this talk, I will discuss just how to do that, starting with the litigation hold and preservation letters, to the best practices for collecting and review only relevant ESI. Computer forensics will be explained and the scenarios in which a forensic examination is recommended. This presentation will also discuss the much over looked area of collecting data from mobile devices, the life of a text message and physical acquisition v. logical .acquisition.

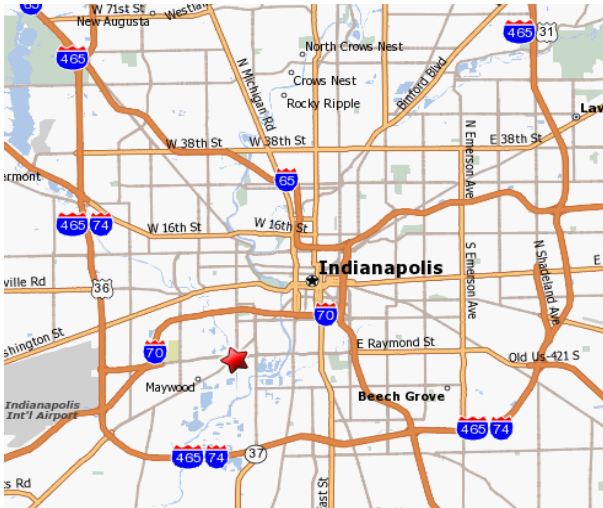
